Fostering for Waggy Tails Rescue

I started fostering dogs for Waggy Tails Rescue in 2000 and 17 years later I still get the enjoyment of helping dogs to find their forever homes. I can certainly tell you that some dogs have been harder than others, but the majority have been delightful. I have opened up my home to over 800 dogs over the years; from as young as a few days old that have needed to be fed every few hours, to dogs just needing a sunny bed and a homely feeling for their old age retirement.

I have nursed dogs back to health after being in a very poorly state and your heart just smiles to see them gain strength, confidence and then begin to blossom into happy little personalities. A lot of people would have met or heard about Milo who was paralysed and went on to have 2 very happy years in his new home. Also a Chihuahua who had to have a leg amputated. He gained a new lease of life and a family now have the enjoyment of his big character and his quirky ways.

Fostering a dog is a very rewarding experience as no two dogs are the same. To see a thin dog gain weight or an overweight one lose it, gives you a sense of achievement. When a nervous dog starts to respond positively to you for attention or cuddles it just melts the heart. Having a sick dog in your arms not knowing what to do and with your love and determination it starts to **become well again, that's what makes fostering so** great. As well as food and water they all need love, attention, training and, hopefully not too often, the vet.



People often ask me, 'How can you let them go?' There is a simple answer, I know I have done my best for them and now it is time for them to go to their forever homes so that I can help the next little dog in need. I think the qualities needed to be a fosterer are patience, time, devotion and most importantly is a stable home environment. Oh, a sense of humour helps as well! Some do tug on the heart strings and others you are only too happy to see them go to their new homes. So if you ask me, 'Is fostering a good idea?' I would say, fostering is not easy, in fact it can be very hard, but to see a dog gain back its life and go to a forever home is worth every second you spend with them.

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN THE DOGS LEAVE WAGGY TAILS RESCUE?

Paws - from Rescue Dog to Pets As Therapy dog Paws was adopted at the age of 6 months from Waggy Tails. He had a difficult start and initially was very fearful of other dogs, lunging and barking aggressively. Although they had not been aware of the extent of his problems when they adopted him, his new family quickly became attached to Paws and wanted to keep him. With a great deal of hard work and the help of a dog trainer, Paws' family, over a long period of time, have learned how to manage his fear aggression and now, with careful handling and slow, planned meetings, Paws has made friends with several different dogs, although he still doesn't enjoy meeting those he doesn't know. Paws' family say this about his work as a PAT dog:



Paws loves people and especially children, so when he was 5 we applied for him to be a Pets as Therapy dog. We advised them of his problems with dogs, but passed their he

assessment (carried out by a vet) with flying colours, and we then approached Bournemouth Hospital. They almost bit our hands off in their excitement and, following my own assessment, we started visiting the Stroke Unit Day room in March this year and he became Bournemouth's first ever PAT dog.

He has been a big hit with Patients and Staff, and seems to really enjoy the visits.

Benny from the Puppy Farm



Benny came into Waggy Tails in 2016. He had obviously been a loved and well cared for dog but circumstances changed and his original owner had to part with him. Sue took him home to foster, and it soon became apparent he had a problem with his back legs. Unfortunately this turned out to be a major issue requiring a complicated and expensive operation. Benny had been bred in Eastern Europe where the puppy farms are as bad, if not worse, than the ones in the British Isles. Joint disorders, along with many other chronic health and behaviour problems, are common in dogs from puppy farms. Please do not buy a puppy from an unknown source such as from the internet, Facebook, Gumtree, a car boot sale or a pub.

I think he believes everyone is visiting him, not the other way around. The patients play ball with him, give him treats, and he gives them lots of cuddles and kisses. At times he has so much fun he gets tired and falls asleep during the sessions, lying with his head on their feet.

Now we are moving on in the Pets as Therapy world to participate in the Read2Dogs programme. Paws will visit Longford Primary School in Salisbury where the children will read stories to him to help build their confidence in their reading skills. Hopefully he will be calm enough, but only time will tell.

He is a much loved pet with a great comical character, and has been worth the long and hard effort we have all as a family had to put in to him. We fondly remember when he used to shy away from our touch, yet now he paws at us, and barks for more attention. He is a good thief, and has regularly stolen bread, sandwiches, cakes and even the roast pork, not through hunger I add, just cheeky opportunity. He regularly makes us laugh, and you can see how much he loves life, and would dearly like to make friends with other dogs, but just does not have the confidence.

From Rescue to Pets as Therapy, a long road for Paws, and more obstacles yet to overcome - dogs on television, creaking doors, screaming fireworks to name a few, but even if he never overcomes them, he has enriched our lives, and so many others, and will hopefully continue to do so for many years to come. Before surgery he couldn't walk on his back legs and slept with his face down and bottom in the air due to his hips! He is now fit and can run as though he has never had anything wrong with him. We love Benny, he is an amazing character and we are so lucky to have the pleasure of adopting him. He has fitted perfectly into our family! We are extremely grateful to the Waggy Tails team for allowing us to be Benny's forever home.
